

WELCOME TO KAKISA

Known as Ka'a'gee in the South Slavey language, this small, traditional Dene community, made up of log cabins, blazing fireweed and fragrant evergreens, is nestled beside the sparkling waters of Kakisa Lake.







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NOT TO BE MISSED



Opened in 2016, the Ka'a'gee Tu First Nation community hall is a bright and beautiful modern building with a wrap-around wooden deck. It hosts community feasts, dances and recreational programming. It's a warm space to stop into in town, with a stunning view of Kakisa Lake.

The community garden at the edge of Kakisa Lake was started in 2014 and has been growing since. The raised garden beds were installed and seeded with hearty vegetables and potatoes to help with the challenge of accessing food in the tiny, remote community.





The Kakisa River Day
Use Area has picnic
tables, firepits and
benches as well as public
washrooms and a boat launch.
It's a great place to stop for
lunch and if you want to stretch
your legs, there's a hiking trail
that leads to Lady Evelyn Falls.

Just outside the community of Kakisa is Lady Evelyn Falls, a 17m-high curtain of water pouring over limestone cliffs. There's a Territorial campground at the falls, and a staircase that leads to the bottom of the gorge and base of the falls. If you're here in spring, bring your rod, the Arctic Grayling run is epic.
