The NWT capital regularly hosts territorial and pan-territorial tournaments, along with a variety of national competitions. With state-of-the-art recreational facilities, capital city amenities and infrastructure and a large, committed base of volunteers, Yellowknife has successfully run weeks-long multi-sport and cultural events like the Arctic Winter Games and the 2020 Scotiabank Hockey Day in Canada.



THE YELLOWKNIFE MULTIPLEX HAS HOSTED AN EDMONTON OILERS ROOKIE CAMP AND SCOTIABANK'S HOCKEY DAY IN CANADA, AS WELL AS MANY ANNUAL NORTHERN HOCKEY TOURNAMENTS.

YELLOWKNIFE MULTIPLEX

The Yellowknife Multiplex houses two ice pads—one Olympic-sized and one NHL-sized surface. The Multiplex is home to the Yellowknife Speed Skating Club and Yellowknife Skating Club, so both rinks can accommodate speed skating and figure skating events. Each rink features five changerooms and an official's room—all of which include toilet and showers. Combined seating for the two arenas is 1200. The Multiplex is also home to the Yellowknife Gymnastics Club and an all-purpose, 23m-by-24m gymnasium, which hosts a variety of indoor events. A concession operates on weekends and for special events.












YELLOWKNIFE FIELDHOUSE

Located beside the Multiplex, the Yellowknife Fieldhouse includes two, 26m-by-56m indoor multi-use fields, which host indoor soccer, futsol and flag-football tournaments. Each field has four change rooms with showers and toilets. The facility also includes a three-lane, 240-metre indoor track upstairs.



The new Aquatic Center will include accessible amenities such as a 25 metre, eight lane pool with two diving boards and a waterslide. It will also feature two meeting rooms, a steam room, a large hot tub, children's splash pad, and a lazy river as well as a leisure pool with three swim lanes and beach access.





YK COMMUNITY ARENA


The Yellowknife Community Arena features one NHL-sized ice surface, which hosts hockey, broomball, ringette and figure skating events. There are four changerooms and an official's room, with showers and toilets. The Yellowknife Community Arena also includes concession facilities and seating for roughly 500.

YELLOWKNIFE CURLING CLUB

Next door, the Yellowknife Curling Club, where hometown hero and World Champion Kevin Koe first honed his skills, features eight curling sheets. The curling club has multiple changerooms and a heated lounge, which provides a view of all the on-ice action.

CROSS COUNTRY SKI TRAILS

Just minutes from downtown, the Yellowknife Ski Club boasts an impressive 14-kilometre network of groomed trails, including two kilometres with night-lighting. The club also features a biathlon range and large chalet, with kitchen, lounge and waxing room.

BRISTOL PIT SNOWBOARD PARK


The annual NWT Squash Territorial Championships welcomes between 80 and 120 participants from across the territory, as well as the Yukon, Alberta and B.C. for a week-long tournament, which features an exhibition from eight of the top players in the country.

TOMMY FORREST BALL PARK

A crown jewel of downtown Yellowknife, the newly renovated Tommy Forest Ball Park is a family-friendly diamond that plays hosts to annual men's and junior fastball tournaments.

RACQUET CLUB

Located a short distance from most major hotels, Yellowknife's Racquet Club features four international-sized squash courts, with a central court that includes a glass-back with viewing area. The Racquet Club also has a lounge, hot tub, massage services and full gym facilities.
